Have you seen the Queen of Hearts?

For the past 13 weeks, Together We Cope has hosted its Queen of Hearts Raffle every Thursday at Bailey's Bar and Grill in Tinley Park. Friends, family and supporters of Together We Cope: Come out and enjoy the festive atmosphere in anticipation of the card reveal.

You may be wondering, what is the Queen of Hearts Raffle? It is a game consisting of a deck of 52 shuffled playing cards, plus two jokers. Each card is placed onto a sealed game board, numbered from one to 54 and displayed during event hours. To play, one must purchase a set of raffle tickets (\$5 for six tickets), write their name, phone number and the number on the playing board where they think the Queen of Hearts is hiding. Each week, a ticket is drawn randomly from a large bin, and the card that corresponds with the number on that ticket is revealed. If it is the Queen of Hearts, the

ticket holder wins the grand prize (60% of pot if present, 50% if not). If there is no grand prize winner, the game rolls over with whatever cards are remaining. In addition to the Queen of Hearts, additional winning payouts include: any other Queen or Ace: \$100 if present, \$20 if not present and Joker: \$250 if present, \$20 if not present.



At print time, the jackpot was over \$9,000.

Don graduated from Harrison High School in Chicago and went on to earn a degree in education from Northern Illinois University. He then served during the Korean Conflict before beginning his teaching career at Washington High School in Chicago. Don served in many roles to help people. He was an active member of Kiwanis, volunteered at the Worth Food Pantry and Palos Community Hospital, and the boards of directors for Chicago Memorial Association and Palos Heights Parks and Recreation.

He is survived by three children and six grandchildren. His wife, Jura, died in 2016.

"I love working at Together We Cope! This is my passion, this is what I need to do in my life," she says of her work.

Hannah Ryan joins client services



Social work often is about doing the greatest good for the greatest number of people, but sometimes it's the impact on one individual that is most rewarding. That's why Hannah Ryan entered the field.

"I chose this work because I wanted to help people and make a difference in their lives," Hannah said. "I feel like in social work you strive to make change for the most number of people, but I'm sort of on the side of the individual. I like to see the impact we can make on one person who needs our help."

Hannah received her bachelor's degree in social work from Olivet Nazarene University in Bourbonnais, and worked at a homeless shelter before coming to Together We Cope in September where she now works in client services. She recalls the case of a family of three with an adult daughter who was the only one with an income. "They were so grateful for the assistance we could give them, and that is a good feeling to help someone out," she said.

Feeding the people is their common goal

When George Rumbaugh retired as Together We Cope's food pantry manager this fall and Tony Roman took on the job, it soon became apparent the two men shared a common goal.

"In general, I've always wanted to give as much food as we can to the families who come to us for help each day," George said as he reflected on his six years with the pantry. "I've tried to make it fun, networking with other agencies or farmers to get a lot of different kinds of food into our pantry. And people are very appreciative of what they can receive here at Cope, they tell us that all the time."

Tony expressed the same sentiment shortly after taking over as pantry manager. "Sometimes pantry workers ask me where to store the food coming in, and I tell them to distribute as much as possible to the hungry at our door that day. Feed the people, man!" he says of his approach.

George and Tony have a number of other things in common. They are both Tinley Park residents, and both volunteered at TWC before coming on staff. Both also have experience in the food handling business. George retired after 42 years at Jewel Foods, including a long time as store director of the Frankfort Jewel. Tony was warehouse manager at Eat Enterprises, which delivers meals to schools. He also

has had several restaurant serving jobs.

"In this job I see the reality of what a lot of people are dealing with in our economy today," Tony said. "And I get to know our clients, that's nice. They tell you their stories and you understand what they are facing. I find that to be much more powerful than helping out in other ways. I believe that feeding people is the most important thing you can do."

George agrees. "It's a shame in this country that we have to feed so many, especially when Americans throw away so much food. I notice how committed our volunteers are to their specific roles in the pantry, how hard they work to help our clients, so I know they are feeling that too.

describing how they had trouble sleeping at night. They said they were bored in their retirement, and feeling miserable from health problems or inactivity. I suddenly realized how lucky I am to be volunteering at Together We Cope, how fortunate to have this opportunity. I am thankful that I'm healthy enough to work hard, and to do something so important to help others."

Jerry finds another reason to spend so much time at TWC. "Absolutely, it's the camaraderie with the other people here that makes this work fun. It's a very important aspect of volunteering here. There are so many good people I meet and talk with every day."

Tony Roman, food pantry manager, refers to Jerry as part of "the backbone of the pantry operation" because he works so

hard and cheerfully fills any need on any given day. He handles the rigorous task of managing the bread racks four days a week, as well as helping with the truck when necessary. "We couldn't do it without him," Tony said.

A CLIENT'S STORY

No car or no home, which would you choose?

That's the question Cheryl, a single mother with two children, has been asking herself for the past month. Cheryl uses her car to get back and forth from work which, just like the rest of us, allows her to pay the rent and other monthly expenses. For the past two months, Cheryl's car has been unreliable, forcing her to miss days of work and resulting in less pay. She is constantly worrying about making it to work and staying in her home. The anxiety and fear

is overwhelming. Cheryl needed help and needed help fast.

This is when Together We Cope stepped in. Cheryl heard about TWC through a co-worker who informed her that Together We Cope helps those in temporary crisis just like her. She came to the TWC offices and spoke with a client services rep who assessed her situation. After their conversation, TWC was able to assist Cheryl financially and help her stay in her home. She will no longer have to worry about affording her car repair versus paying her rent. She will be able to pay her monthly expenses on time and she will no longer have to worry about potentially being without a roof over her head.
